CRG Update: Sept 22, 2022

Our committee is moving ahead full steam with our Pet Wellness Day on October 9th. We have 3 vets and 3 to 5 Vet techs and a volunteers for the day of. We hope to be able to see 40 to 50 animals max that day. Vaccinations, flea, tick, nail trim. Gift bags for the animals and for their owners will be given out as well. This is a first come 1st serve day. It is held at the DUO site on Simcoe St S location from 12 to 4. Flyers have gone out to a few selected locations. Back Door Mission, Settlement House, Seniors Centre on John St. Seniors buildings on Mill St, Durham Dignity for the Homeless. Donations from Pet Value, Pet Smart, OAS, Kibble Project, Vets and others have been received and are being sorted and put into grab bags.

This is a pilot project with limited ability to see large volumes on this day. If their seems to be a need we could look at another event in the spring.

The By-law & Regulatory Working Group continues to research 'Animals and Fireworks' regarding the possible recommendation for a regulatory amendment to the city Fireworks by-law.

The By-law & Regulatory Working Group continues to research standards for travelling or temporary exhibits such as, but not limited to, circuses, petting zoos and any promotional exhibits using animals.

A motion for committee to be tabled...

Amendment to the Responsible Pet Owner By-law. Regulating the Commercial Sale for Profit of Cats, Dogs and Rabbits Within a Pet Shop.

That a pet shop is not permitted to use any form of advertising or promotion on or about its premises or to use the pet shop name and/or contact details, to give away or to facilitate the sale, for any reason, the commercial sale of any cat, dog or rabbit.

The current exemption that applies to a pet shop acting as a satellite location to facilitate the adoption of cats, dogs and rabbits from the Municipal Shelter, Durham Humane Society and Rescues to remain as-is.
